Tobacco Control Laws that Affect Retail Businesses

This easy-to-read brochure was revised in November 2010 and contains basic information on California tobacco control laws that affect the retail environment: sales of flavored and "light", "low" and "mild" cigarettes; sales of bidi cigarettes; requirements for tobacco packaging, sale of single cigarettes and roll-your-own tobacco; prohibition of free tobacco samples; prohibition of cigarette self-service displays; prohibition of tobacco sales to minors; retailer licensing, requirements for signs and storefront advertising; and tips for owners and managers on compliance issues. Tracking and Reporting Illegal Tobacco Sales to Minors: A How-to Guide for Projects Funded by the California Tobacco Control Program

CTCP and the Point of Sale Practices Workgroup strongly recommend that local jurisdictions become familiar with this optional tool, released in February 2008. The main purpose of the How-to Guide is to encourage local jurisdictions to track and report violations of sales to minor laws and local licensing ordinances to the California Attorney General's Office (AG) and the California Board of Equalization (BOE). Reporting locally adjudicated—or closed—cases to these agencies may

stimulate further enforcement action against businesses in violation of sales to minors laws. All local jurisdictions are urged to follow the recommended procedures for tracking and reporting to whatever extent possible.

Senate Bill (SB) 624—Local Enforcement of the Stop Tobacco Access to Kids Enforcement (STAKE) Act

Effective January 1, 2008, Senate Bill 624 amends Business and Professions Code 22950-22963 to allow local enforcement agencies and other state agencies to enforce the STAKE Act. The passage of SB 624 also raised penalties and established a fine structure within STAKE Act for retailers that do not post the required age-of-sale warning sign. <http://www.tcsstore.org/training/stake01.html>

Law Enforcement Roundtable: Best Practices for Tobacco Retailer Licensing Implementation

CTCP and the Point of Sale Practices Workgroup are in the process of implementing a regional law enforcement roundtables project focused on the identification of best practices, challenges and possible solutions pertaining to local enforcement of illegal sales to minors laws, include local tobacco retailer licensing policies. Regional roundtables were convened in Los Angeles County in September 2008, Walnut Creek (Bay Area) in May 2009, Bakersfield in March 2011, and Grass Valley (Northern California) in March 2009. California Penal Code (PC) 308(a) Enforcement Training

Enforcement agencies that are or will be conducting PC, Section 308(a) compliance checks in their local jurisdictions are strongly encouraged to enroll in a free PC 308(a) Enforcement Training. POST credits available. PC 308(a) prohibits the selling, giving, or furnishing tobacco products or paraphernalia to a minor. Licensing: Rural California Poll

In March 2008, the Center commissioned a survey of rural and small town voters in California to determine their level of support for a local tobacco retailer license and to identify unique challenges to getting an ordinance adopted in rural communities. The survey results demonstrate strong support for a licensing ordinance with 78% of rural voters in favor of a local tobacco retailer licensing ordinance.
